The thought of college life may seem a bit daunting, but you'll have lots in common with the students at EN, as they're all school leavers too all aged between 16-19.



My role is to organise extracurricular clubs and societies relating to the STEMM subjects.


I also create and make students aware of STEMM opportunities by working with the communication officer.

At the heart of the College is our light, spacious, reception. It's the main entrance and exit for the College and where lots of events happen throughout the year. The Adnitt Centre




You will find help with work related learning, including employability, volunteering, work placements and internships. You can access guidance about financial support, UCAS, apprenticeship and job applications.

At college you will have a Personal Tutor who will be the first point of contact to help you with any issues you may encounter during your time with us, either at college or in your life generally.

You will also have a Progress Mentor who may provide additional support if needed. Progress Mentors spend all their time supporting students and are trained to help with a wide range of issues. They can be found in Poulson or the Adnitt Centre.

Adnitt is also home to the Student Association, and a very comfortable place for work and quiet relaxation.

Supporting your journey

Each year we provide support for around 300 students with a wide variety of learning needs and disabilities.

We have established strong provision for learners with a wide range of needs including autism, specific learning difficulties, physical and sensory impairments and mental health needs.

Our integrated provision covers welfare, pastoral and learning support services.

We work closely with partner schools and other institutions through transition planning between school and college to make sure we are aware of learning support needs as soon as possible so that we develop appropriate plans for students.

We are happy to make visits to schools and other institutions to support the transition process.

Once students with identified needs arrive at EN they can be offered a range of distinct support provision within the Additional Learning Support team, in addition to the wider support arrangements within curriculum, pastoral and welfare teams.

One of the biggest (nonacademic) benefits of choosing East Norfolk Sixth Form College is the fact it's situated in the very heart of Gorleston and the local community.


Gorleston is a popular seaside resort and tourist destination with a history rooted in the herring fishing industry.

Work Related Learning

We are passionate about preparing students for their futures, whatever their ambition.

In a hugely competitive environment, whether straight from college or via university, you will need to develop your employability skills to succeed. Quite often employers tell us it is not only important to succeed academically but also to have personal skills such as flexibility, reliability, good communication skills, team working and initiative. Our programme will help you to develop these qualities through a variety of initiatives.

We have established contacts with a multitude of employers from all of the main employment sectors. Students can opt to take part in placements within an industry or sector that may interest them. In return, students will need to demonstrate commitment, produce a supporting statement and attend an interview at the prospective placement.

Many of our students get involved in project work with local businesses and other organisations. This is not only great for their CVs but gives them an opportunity to work to a real brief, liaising with the 'customer'.

We now offer Weekly Wednesday Workshops with a wide range of sectors and job roles to give students more detailed information on each job role.

We are working with local community groups to develop community projects that students can engage with to give them real life experiences.

We help students plan for possible progression routes, with annual Volunteer and Apprenticeship Fairs, weekly talks and workshops from visiting speakers, a HE progression information evening and several enterprise events.

New for 2019



EN has been granted approval by the Ministry of Defence to set up a Combined Cadet Force (CCF)

This will be one of only five CCFs operating in Norfolk and the first in the East of the county.

Becoming a cadet can be a life changing experience and provide the opportunity to take part in

a huge range of exciting and adventurous activities. This could be flying a plane, completing an army obstacle course or learning to sail.

You will quickly build important skills like teamwork, confidence and self-discipline, as well as having the opportunity to take on leadership roles. CCF offers you a chance to get to know a widerange of people from across the college, and work together to take on new challenges.

Opportunities for cadets include parades, whole day and weekend training (field days), annual military camps and courses run by the armed forces.

The CCF is a unique educational partnership that operates across the UK. The programme also links in with elements of the British Army, the Royal Navy, Royal Marines or the Royal Air Force.

The EN CCF will have an Army focus initially.

The Football

A comprehensive football coaching programme that allows for team and individual development.

Players also take part in a series of Futsal activities and fixtures to support their technical development, mobility and decision making.

Players selected for squads will have the opportunity to represent Norwich City CSF against other professional clubs and college programmes.

The Education

Students will study for a BTEC Level 3 Extended Diploma in Sport or an A level pathway over a two year period.

They will follow a carefully planned pathway of modules to provide them with a broad range of knowledge and skills that are linked to potential career pathways.

The programme covers units such as Anatomy & Physiology, Sports Coaching and Sports Psychology.







Access for A

EN is free for students aged 16 to 18 (you need to be under 19 on 31st August before the start of your studies). All your course materials and exam entries are provided.

College Contribution

Students joining EN are asked to pay a one-off College contribution. This covers a range of benefits to support their learning at EN. The contribution of £50 includes:

- · £20 print credit
- Access to unlimited Wi-Fi
- · Support for external activities and events
- Support with the cost of course textbooks

Students will qualify for a £10 refund at the end of their studies provided they return all their course books prior to leaving the College.

Bursaries

Do you help with the everyday costs of attending college?

Once you have completed the online form and submitted all the information we need, we will send you email confirmation that your application has been received and then contact you to arrange your interview.

Interviews

Every student that applies to EN has an advisory interview that will take place in school or at the College.

Don't worry – it's an informal chat about your chosen subjects, career aspirations and future plans so there is nothing to be nervous about. We also discuss with you about how choosing the right study programme can help you fulfil your ambitions.

If you know what your predicted GCSE results are, then bring them along to your interview as that will help us to make sure you are on the right path.



Priority Applications

If you submit your application by Friday 12 October, you will be offered a priority interview during half-term. This means you are then free to focus on the rest of Year 11 and those all-important exams, safe in the knowledge that your College place is already secured.





3D Design

A level

3D Design is a specialism within the Art and Design team. Students develop skills in design, model making and drawing (both freehand and digital). Following an introductory period students work on personal projects.

The course has a dedicated studio equipped with computers, drawing tables and studio lighting for photographing 3D work. Adjacent to the studio is a well-equipped multi-media workshop for working in metal, wood, plastic, plaster and clay.

Many students have used the course as a stepping stone to degree courses in architecture, product design, engineering, model making, craft and jewellery, gaining entry to some of the most prestigious courses in the country.

Fashion & Textiles

A level

This is a hands-on practical course covering a broad range of processes to suit complete beginners as well as more experienced students.

As the course progresses it gradually becomes more independent with a focus on small group teaching through workshops and 1:1 support; this allows you to develop your own interests and produce personal work in a range of textile outcomes such as fashion garments, interior furnishings and lighting, wall hangings, jewellery and accessories as well as lengths of printed cloth. Students are offered support through individual feedback and tutorials.

At A level, you will select a focus for your studies around a specific aspect of textile design and put into practice skills learnt at AS to make more ambitious and challenging final pieces. There is a strong focus on progression where students are supported to develop their professional portfolios for use in seeking employment or university places.

Fine Art

A level

The Fine Art programme is exciting and challenging, encouraging experimentation and self-expression in a wide variety of media. Students are offered support through individual feedback and tutorials

At AS we teach a broad range of skills through a series of projects where you are encouraged to experiment and develop ideas by reviewing and refining your practice through informed research. As a result, you will begin to develop your own individual style.

At A level you develop a sustained body of work on your chosen personal theme supported by 1000–3000 word dissertation.

Graphics

A level

Graphics is a very diverse subject within the visual arts involving a multitude of art & design disciplines and materials. The emphasis is on experimentation and idea development, often using any appropriate visual means to satisfy illustration and design briefs.

You will gain experience using a range of digital and manual processes with an emphasis on combining both for design realisations. Areas to explore include advertising, branding, illustration, packaging, typography and designs for multi-media.

The course is designed to identify and capitalise on each individual's particular skills and interests, with a central aim of creating a diverse and energetic studio environment. Drawing is an integral part of the course but the emphasis is on developing skills in colour, typography, composition and ideas. We use fully up-to-date, industry standard Adobe software of which no prior knowledge or experience is necessary to start the course.

Photography

A level

Photography in its 176 year history has literally changed the way we see the world. Photography is both art and science. It's at the cutting edge of technological development and the modern world is impossible to imagine without cameras.

Photography is everywhere and is used in multiple ways, from recording in space to the smallest micro cameras in hospitals. The creative industries generate £76.9 billion annually in the British economy and 5% of all jobs are in this sector.

Digital technologies have sparked a revolution in photography and there has never been a more exciting time to study this subject at East Norfolk. There has been a huge investment in providing new accommodation in Photography including two new computer rooms and darkroom in the Newman Building.

Art & Design

BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate

This course provides an opportunity for those who have an interest in the visual arts to explore, develop and test their creativity within a qualification structure which is stimulating and demanding and provides a supportive transition from Level 2 to Level 3.

The course is intended to broaden students existing understanding and knowledge of Art & Design, as well as develop technical skills and working processes. Students will carry out specialist projects in a variety of art and design disciplines.

The course is underpinned with a Visual Studies programme that will develop students' skills in drawing and painting and recording from direct observation.

Art & Design

BTEC Level 4 Foundation Diploma

The Foundation Diploma in Art & Design is designed to enable you to learn through discovery and exploration. We encourage an exploratory approach, giving you a critically creative environment and a wide range of skills to begin to define your own creative practice.

The Foundation course is a transitional experience in art, design and communication to prepare you for a place in higher education or for employment.

Photography

Level 2 Certificate

This qualification is aimed at those wishing to develop an understanding of photographic processes and the photo imaging industry.

The qualification will help you to understand and develop skills enabling them to take and manipulate images using a range of equipment, techniques and image processing software.

You will learn the basics of safe working practices and have the opportunity to explore in detail the following areas of photography: dark room, studio, location, commercial, documentary and experimental and alternative processes. Once you have learned the basics, you can work in an experimental and creative manner producing your own distinctive images in electronic or traditional formats.

Business

BTFC Level 3 Extended Certificate

BTEC Business is a course that when chosen with a good combination of subjects, could open many doors.

Most employers and universities want to be assured that potential candidates are able to contextualise information and apply knowledge and theory and you will learn these skills on the course.

Not only will you gain fundamental knowledge of a range of business organisations and the many factors that shape the nature of them operating in an increasingly complex business world, we will teach you how the management of resources can impact on business performance and how marketing, research and planning and the marketing mix are used. You will also learn how successful communication of information throughout a business is critical for the future prosperity of an organisation, as well as developing an understanding of the fundamental concepts that underpin e-business operations.

Business

BTEC Level 2 First Award

Have you ever wondered how the business world operates?

The daily practices of companies big or small all require key roles and processes whether working in Sales and Personnel or Recruitment and Employment.

This course will give you a valuable insight into this world and will enhance your employability-related skills. You will be able to reflect on your own work experience or those of your family and friends as examples.

Students experience visits from a business advisors and a customer service managers.

An educational visit to Redwings Horse Sanctuary is planned, as is a visit to a local supermarket.

Business Studies

A level

The aim of Business A level is to take an all-inclusive approach to the subject in order to demonstrate the inter-related nature of individual topics. You will use business models, theories and techniques to analyse contemporary business issues and situations.

Year 1 topics:

- Marketing
- Operations
- Human Resources
- Finance

The focus is on how decisions in these four areas can improve business performance. Developments in digital technology, business ethics and globalisation are covered throughout the topics so students can understand their impact on firms.

Economics

A level

- Ever wondered why things cost what they do?
- Ever thought about the choices you make when you buy a product?
- Ever wondered why there is not enough to go round?
- Ever wondered why some people are richer than others?

Then all this and more is covered in A-level Economics. Economics tries to understand how we try to match the unlimited wants that humans have with the limited resources the earth has.

Economics explores how we can do this efficiently and fairly. Economics also considers whether we have achieved the right economic solutions to solve that problem.

You will get the chance to debate this and to consider alternative policies and ideas.

Financial Studies

LIBF Level 3

This course enables you to make informed decisions regarding your finances. It will also help you to become a responsible borrower, sensible saver and to have an appreciation of the need for financial planning throughout your life.

In the second year, the Diploma explores the financial services marketplace from the point of view of the provider and considers the methods that providers use in order to satisfy customer needs, wants and aspirations whilst operating competitively and profitably.

Whether you choose to progress to a career in the finance industry or not, the skills developed on this course will stand you in good stead for life.

Lessons in Financial Education

LIBF Level 1/Level 2

This course is designed to help you manage and understand finances.

You will learn about the various sources of money including earned income with tax and National Insurance calculations, inheritance benefits and borrowing.

You will also learn how to organise your money through personal budgeting, the use of bank and building society accounts and the concept and consequences of overspending.

You will look at the qualifications and opportunities in the banking/financial sectors in terms of employment.

LIBF are leaders in world financial qualifications.

If you progress to Level 3 qualifications and achieve well, you can apply to their very own university in London to study a degree in a financial related subject (and it's much cheaper than other universities!)

Travel & Tourism

BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate

The Travel and Tourism sector continues to grow at a rapid pace for leisure and business purposes, and Norfolk has a rich diversity in the tourist industry which has historically provided a vast amount of career opportunities within it.

We're looking to help fill specific skills gaps identified such as customer service skills, geographical knowledge and related business skills.

This qualification has been designed to provide an all-round introduction for those looking for careers in connected industries, including retail travel, visitor attractions, accommodation, transport and tour operations.

Accounting (Foundation Certificate)

AAT / Pre-Apprenticship

Please note this is course for 18 year olds only.

The Foundation Certificate in Accounting will teach you how to work effectively in finance using a range of basic accounting principles and techniques, from costing and double-entry book-keeping to computerised accounting.

The course forms part of a recognised route for those entering the accountancy profession. It will take up one teaching block and there is an expectation that you should support this with external work experience. This will enable you to meet future membership requirements with the Association of Accounting Technicians. Where possible, interactive events with local employers will be provided by the College to aid you in meeting this requirement.

Computer Science

A level

You do not need to have prior knowledge of Computing but this is an academically demanding course.

Graduate salaries start at £28k, there is a huge global shortage of computer science graduates, it is a growing area too, so there are many opportunities in the sector. You will learn through practical application, research and interactive activities how to solve problems using programming.

You should be prepared to spend time learning how to program and developing skills which will be of use in the workplace.

Computer Science is the fastest growing subject at both GCSE and A level and is a key area for job prospects in an increasingly digital age.

IT (Single)

BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate

This course will be particularly suitable if you wish to prepare for a career in the IT and computing industries and related areas.

The average salary for an IT Technician is £27,000 and £52,500 for Programmers.

It will appeal to you if you want a programme of study that is intellectually challenging and want also to carry out practical work and be creative. Students will be given the opportunity to develop a range of skills, techniques and personal qualities and attitudes that are essential for a career in the computing sector.

In year one you will learn how to create an information system by developing a working knowledge of relational databases, along with exploring social media and how to ensure social media is effective in today's modern business environment. In year two you will learn how modern computer systems function and how these interact with each other. You will also develop a working knowledge of how to develop websites to industry standard.

IT (Double)

BTEC Level 3 Diploma

You will have the opportunity to develop a range of skills, techniques, personal qualities and attitudes that are essential for a career in the computing sector.

There are opportunities to get involved in work experience with local companies throughout the year and to progress onto a paid internship at the end of the course.

In year one you will learn how to create an information system by developing a working knowledge of relational databases, exploring social media and its effectiveness in today's modern business environment. You will learn how modern computer systems function and develop a working knowledge of website development.

In year two you will learn how to code using industry standard language and software. Alongside these units you will learn how to work in a team to achieve a goal and how to manage an IT project. You will also explore cybersecurity and how to keep computer system secure in the 21st century.

Information & Creative Technology

BTEC Level 2 First Award

Your examined unit completed in the first term will look at 'The Online World' and the services and applications that exist online. It includes looking at communication, document sharing and advertising.

A two-year-old website may be too old!

All web designers have to work hard to keep up with constant changing technologies. The devices being used to access websites are constantly changing and therefore the way that those websites are developed have keep pace with this.

Website that are old risk not displaying properly in new web browsers, or most importantly not showing up in a search engine's end result There is also a focus on learning how to stay safe online. You will look at how users create an 'internet footprint' and how you and others make use of the internet and all its functions.

In the next two terms, you will then create two websites using preexisting software, one a website of your choice and one to produce your own 'Personal Portfolio'.

IT Users

BTFC Level 1 Award

You will complete three units.

You can develop skills in a practical sense such as word processing skills which can enhance your performance in other subjects such as English.

The first covers the basics of IT such as health and safety, staying safe online and organising your computer based work. The second covers word processing, creating and manipulating documents and the third covers presentation software where you will produce a presentation.

We also use Microsoft Imagine Academy to explore other IT areas such as email.

Film Studies

A level

Film is the most important art-form of the last 100 years, bringing together people of all nations and providing entertainment and cultural information whilst pushing the boundaries of technology.

Educational visits include BBC, Pinewood Studios & Warner Bros. Studio Tour London. You'll cover the history of film from its origins in 1895 up to the present day, and you'll make close textual analysis of a number of key films. You will also study national cinemas and influential film movements. Throughout the course you'll gain understanding and enjoyment of a wide variety of films. There is scope to analyse and explore films, filmmakers and actors that appeal to you and you'll be able to produce coursework projects centred on people and texts that you are passionate about.

You will need a high level of enthusiasm for film and an interest in undertaking detailed film analyses for both the coursework and the exam.

Games Design & Production

AIM Award (Level 4)

For students who have completed their Level 3 studies and who will not be over the age of 18 on 1 September.

This course presents a unique opportunity to further learning and skills development in games whilst also focussing on progression.

In 2018, Ukie reported that the UK games market grew 12.4% to a record £5.11bn in 2017 and as of June 2018, there were over 2,200 active games companies in the UK.

The Level 4 course will enable you to work with clients and produce real work for real briefs whilst also focussing on individual specialisms, whether design, modelling, programming or something else.

Throughout the course you will think about the next stage and generate career development materials that will be used to apply for post-EN opportunities such as university or employment and you will also have a chance to attend EGX and other video game expos in order to network and make those all-important connections.

Games Production

BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate

You will develop skills using industry standard software within the dynamic interactive media industry with an emphasis on games development and building 3D models and environments

The UK Games industry employs over 5,500 people, 48% of which are hired directly from education. The average income for someone working in Games, in the UK, is £30,755.

Over the two years you will work individually and in groups to create computer game levels and assets. You will complete assignments that will develop vital transferable skills that we help you when looking for jobs and when applying for higher education courses, such as pitching ideas, working with a variety of applications and working for a specified brief to deadlines.

You will also be given a chance to look at job roles in the gaming industry and what is needed in order to pursue them.

Games Production

BTEC Level 2 First Award

This course has been designed to encourage you to aspire to a career in the creative industries.

Young people who recreationally engage with video games are able to develop skills and knowledge that will enable them to see how their interest can be transposed into a viable career goal.

You will explore who makes games and who they are made for and also develop and hone key practical skills in digital games production using an industry standard games engine and professional applications. In addition to creating a portion of the game and associated assets, you will also produce print-based marketing materials using the Adobe Suite.

Media Studies

A level

The UK Media industry is the fifth biggest media industry in the world!

We run a variety of visits and events each year. These include:

- Annual London visit to; Cinema Museum in Lambeth; BFI Cinema Screening; Tate Modern (South Bank) and Warner Bros. (Harry Potter) Studio Tour.
- Annual visit to an IntoFilm Festival screening in Norwich.
- Regular guest speakers, including industry professionals and ex-EN alumni.

There is no denying the importance of media or how much we have come to rely on it; the new A level in Media Studies looks holistically at the institutions behind various media platforms and the audiences that consume them.

The way people, places and events are represented will play a large part of the course and you will also focus on different platforms and how they have come to converge alongside the study of media language. Throughout the course you will be given the opportunity to study music videos, video games, advertising, film marketing, newspapers and news / current affairs programmes.

Video Production (Digital Media)

OCR Level 3 Certificate / Extended Certificate

This course has been designed to provide learners with the knowledge, understanding and skills they will need to pursue a job in the creative media industries. They will develop professional and social skills through interaction with performers, clients and peers; as well as theoretical and technical knowledge and understanding.

Students will develop conceptual ideas, and visualise these all the way through the production cycle; from planning and pre-production right through to editing, post production and presentation of products. Students will also learn how to analyse target audience requirements, research market demand and bring a media concept alive, working in line with legal and regulatory requirements.

Video Production (Digital Media)

BTFC Level 2 First Award

This course has been designed to encourage learners to aspire to a career in the creative industries.

At EN, we use industry standard equipment and applications (Adobe Premier Pro, After Effects and Audition).

Young people who recreationally engage with moving image texts such as films, television programmes and digital videos are able to develop skills and knowledge that will enable them to see how their interest can be transposed into a viable career goal.

Learners will explore who makes videos and who they are made for and will also develop and hone key practical skills in digital video production using an industry standard equipment and professional applications. In additional to creating a moving images texts, learners will also produce print-based marketing materials using the Adobe Suite.

English Language

A level

English Language enables you to develop your interest and enjoyment of English and gives you a deep knowledge of how language works in a wide variety of real-world spoken and written texts

'The CEOs of many Fortune 500 companies are English graduates' Professor Katy Shaw.

Visits include workshops at the British Library and to the English Language A level Conference in London. Language is distinct from A level Literature as, on this course, you will focus mainly on non-fiction texts. You will also engage creatively with topical issues in language in use. Throughout your studies, you will develop your understanding of all the influences that shape the language we use every day.

English Language

GCSE

GCSE English Language will improve skills of analysis and interpretation as a reader as well as building a wider, usable vocabulary as a writer.

Written accuracy and clarity will also be a focus for improvement.

GCSE English is taught through a variety of intriguing and challenging texts from different time periods. We ask students to engage with relevant contemporary issues and encourage them to develop their own lines of argument.

English Language

Functional Skills

The English Functional Skills course is designed to help build your skills and confidence in English so that you can progress to the GCSE English Language course.

Unlike most other English qualifications, Functional Skills still assesses speaking and listening, so you get a fantastic opportunity to express your ideas verbally. This is very helpful for those who have excellent ideas but struggle to express them in writing.

English Literature

A level

The AS course

The two AS exams are on Shakespeare and Poetry (Paper 1), and Prose (Paper 2). For Paper 1, you will study Othello and a collection of pre-1900 poetry, for a closed book exam worth 50% of the AS. This paper has essay questions on each text. For Paper 2, you will study two novels, The Great Gatsby and Persuasion for an open book exam, which is also worth 50%. Paper 2 will have a comparative essay question on the novels you have studied as well as a question on an unseen extract.

The A level course

Othello, The Great Gatsby and the poetry will be assessed again for the first A level exam. You will study The Woman in White for the first NEA text, which you can pair with a text of your choice for an independent extended essay. You will also study modern poetry, prose and drama in your second year, which will be assessed in the second A level exam.





History

A level

History is a very rewarding subject to study because it tries to interpret and explain the events, issues and major personalities that have helped to shape the world we live in.

The options in the first year are linked by the themes of nationalism and dictatorship and their links with democracy. In studying Germany (Paper 1) and either Italy or Spain (Paper 2), a similar pattern of political change occurred that saw unstable democracies replaced by nationalist dictatorships, with significant impacts on the wider history of Europe, before returning to democratic forms of government.

The course will help develop the skills and qualities required for further education or employment. It will help you develop the ability to evaluate and analyse evidence.

It will also help you to formulate clear and precise arguments that are well-communicated and well-supported so you should never lose an argument again!

Law

A level

At some point in your life you will come into contact with the English legal system, whether this is to set up a business, write a will, get a divorce or report a crime.

Previous trips have included visits to the European Parliament in Strasbourg; the Houses of Parliament and Supreme Court in London; Norwich Crown Court to witness the law in action and a unique opportunity in your second year to participate in the Bar National Mock Trial Competition, where students pit their wits against other schools and colleges by taking on the roles of barristers, witnesses and court personnel in a dramatic courtroom showdown.

The A level law course will de-mystify the legal system by introducing you to the people and processes involved in creating laws, along with the role of the police, legal professionals and the ordinary men and women of the jury. You will develop critical thinking skills and learn to apply these laws to factual scenarios so that you are able to advise on the likely outcome.

Buddhist represent 10% of the world's population, representing 535 million people.



Core Maths

Level 3 Certificate

Core Maths can be taken as a two year, one lesson a week, course as part of the Enhance programme or as a one year course as one block of your timetable.

It is a relatively new qualification designed to develop students' mathematical skills and focuses on using and applying mathematics to address authentic problems drawn from study, work and life.

It is strongly recommended that you take Core Maths if you study any of the following subjects and do not take A level Maths: Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Engineering, Computer Science, Business Studies, Economics, Financial Studies, Psychology, Geography, Geology or Environmental Science.

Engineering (Single)

BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate

Engineering is defined as the branch of science and technology concerned with the design, building, and use of engines, machines, and structures.

In an overview engineering is a study of how obstructions can be overcome by the application of mathematic. Engineering is a highly diverse area and the course is made up of a variety of topics covering a large range of engineering branches, to give an idea of future careers.

You will study a range of topics ranging from Health and safety to electrical, mechanical and chemical with an emphasis on mathematics.

Engineering (Single)

BTEC Level 2

In an overview, engineering is a study of how obstructions can be overcome by the application of mathematics.

Environmental Science

A level

Environmental Science is a very topical, inter-disciplinary A level subject combining aspects of Biology, Geology, and Geography.

Trips include Winterton, Thrigby Hall Wildlife Gardens, RSPB Minsmere, Natural History Museum and Marriott's Way Heritage Trail. You will study the science behind a range of issues including conservation in the UK and abroad, managing water and mineral resources, energy supplies, global warming, pollution, waste management, farming and food supplies.

Ultimately the course provides overview of the issues arising as a result of a growing and developing population. It's ideal for anyone interested in contemporary environmental issues, systems thinking and sustainability.

Further Maths

A level

Taking Further Maths allows you to study a greater breadth of the branches of Mathematics and also explore some in more depth.

If you enjoy Mathematics and are a strong mathematician it is the ideal course to prepare you for a route into university to study Maths or any Maths related Science degree.

Please note:

By choosing Further Maths, you are choosing two blocks of study. In Year 12, you will study the full A level in Mathematics (no AS). In Year 13, you will study the full A level in Further Mathematics (no AS).

Geography

A level

Geography provides an exciting opportunity to engage with the world around us.

With a focus on fieldwork to delve more deeply, this gives a great opportunity for students to investigate an area of the specification that interests them.

Geography aims to encourage learners to develop a range of essential skills for Higher Education and the world of work through content which is relevant to any citizen of the planet in the 21st century.

Through exciting topics learners will understand the nature of physical and human geography whilst unpicking the debates surrounding some of the challenges facing the world today.

One of the reasons geography is such a great discipline is because it spans so many areas such as soil and water, cities and history, politics and culture.

Geography offers opportunities to make connections across boundaries and this is one of the reasons why it is a highly regarded subject by employers and universities.

Geology

A level

Geology is a practical, multidisciplinary science. Geologists are scientific detectives who try to reveal the past and predict the future of the Earth, studying rocks, earthquakes, volcanoes and the landforms of the planet.

British geologists have found more oil than all the geologists of all the other countries put together.

Fossils are studied to help understand the evolution of life. Geologists also play a leading role in managing natural materials such as water supplies, energy resources and mineral deposits.

Maths

A level

Maths (Foundation)

Drama & Theatre

A level

This is an exciting and challenging course, academically and practically. It helps you to develop strong independent and group working skills and encourages you to be resourceful and inventive

Our students are offered a vast amount of support and guidance with both practical and written work.

Tutors offer 1:1 rehearsal support as well as group rehearsals throughout the working week, weekend and half terms. You'll explore classical and modern plays and will learn about performance theory through practical exploration of text and evaluative writing. You have to manage your time well and attend extensive rehearsals after college and at weekends, and make evening theatre visits. You will work closely with the students in your group and may find that you make your best friends at college in the Drama studio.

Through taking Drama and Theatre students will develop as confident and independent learners, recognise the importance of self-discipline and, develop time management skills, become resilient learners, and develop analytical thinking skills and inquisitiveness.

Music

A level

This course includes all the different aspects of Music including performance, composition, listening and appraising.

We are committed to the arts.

EN is the only college locally to offer both Music & Music Technology A level. It focuses on a student's strengths of either performance or composition.

This course is especially suitable if students want to go on to Higher Education to do a Music degree.

Music Technology

A level

Students will have an opportunity to create, record and discover all about sound and the music which we enjoy every day.

Cubase Pro is an industry standard piece of software used by studios and producers the world over.

Hans Zimmer is a famous Cubase prosumer and has produced and composed the music for Inception, The Dark Knight and Kung Fu Panda all in the same DAW that we use at EN! Focused towards the practical and theoretical aspects of music technology, students will use industry standard software and equipment to create their own projects. They will develop both their musical skills as well their understanding of music technology whilst allowing the freedom to be creative within the boundaries set by the exam board.

The college's facilities are excellent with software such as Cubase Pro 9.5 DAW running alongside Reason, Halion 6 and Native Instruments Komplete sound banks. The software runs on quad core dual screen PC's and there is a fully equipped recording studio with an Apple Mac Pro, Cubase Pro DAW and a 24 track Mackie firewire system. Our isolated recording space ensures top quality recordings and we also have a 'mobile' recording setup to encourage our students to experiment with ambient sound recording techniques.

Applied Psychology (Single)

BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate

Psychology is the scientific study of mind and behaviour. This course aims to investigate ways in which psychologists explore human interactions, so you can gain an insight into how and why some behaviours occur.

Educational Visit - Three Day residential trip to London with visits to the Freud Museum, Forensic workshop and phobias workshop at London Zoo. The qualification covers key areas of psychological theory and concepts, combined with the opportunity to design and carry out small scale research project. Its applied element also looks at the everyday use and application of psychological theory, exploring current issues, such as gender identity, aggression in society and advertising.

Criminology

WJEC Level 3

Criminology aims to answer a number of key questions in society such as:

- How do we explain why people commit crime?
- What makes someone become a serial killer or abusive to their own families?

Knowing about different criminological theories will give you a sharper insight into the kind of thinking used by experts and politicians to explain crime and criminality.

The course provides an understanding of crime and deviance but also gives an insight into the range of related careers. Criminology L3 is equivalent to an AS/A level.

Criminology

Level 2

Criminology is the study of criminals, victims and theories explaining illegal behaviour.

The peak age for male offending is 18, whilst for females it is 15

You will also look at the social reaction to crime and the effectiveness of anti-crime policies. This course is equivalent to a GCSE level course.

Psychology

A level

This course involves the scientific study of mind and behaviour, looking at how and why people behave the way they do.

You actually do use most of your brain, most of the time. It's a common misconception that people only use a tiny portion of their brain, this is actually not true. The fact is, most of your brain is constantly working—to sense, process, think, move, and even dream. Even when you head to sleep at night, your brain is still hard at work!

You will learn about the different approaches to psychology and some key research studies, as well as developing the skills required to design a small scale psychological research project.

You will also be encouraged to discuss human behaviour and to evaluate the explanations that have been proposed within psychology.

Psychology

Level 2

Psychology is the science of the human mind and human behaviour. It involves looking at why we think and behave in the way that we do.

Doing things that scare you will make you happier.

In this course you will learn what Psychology is about and the different approaches psychologists use to explain the human mind and behaviour. It includes topics such as memory, criminal behaviour, phobias and obedience. In addition, the course will involve understanding how to design and conduct a piece of psychological research.

To join the course you do not need to have studied Psychology before.

Social Science & Humanities

Level 2

Social Science studies society, how it is changing and how people try to improve it.

What do Martin Luther King Jr, Robin Williams, and Michelle Obama have in common? They all have Sociology qualifications!

Visits include the FiLia feminist conference in Manchester!

It examines the way we fit into society and the factors that shape our behaviour. Sociologists look at the experience of different groups in society related to factors such as their gender. Sociology asks a range of questions you will be able to consider such as:

- Why are there rich and poor people in society?
- Why do people commit crime?
- Why do people join gangs?

Your own experiences of society will be valuable and you will have the chance to communicate your ideas in creative and interesting ways. You will also learn about the research methods sociologists use to study society. In addition, you will learn about mental health disorders, the cause and treatment of them, as well as society's reaction to people with mental health disorders.

Studying Sociology gives you the opportunity to gain an understanding of the world around you and to reflect on social issues that relate to you.


Did you know that 1 in 4 children in the UK live in poverty, and that 51% of the world's population do not have the internet?

Sociology studies society, how it is changing and how it can be improved. It examines the ways we learn to fit in into society and what happens if we don't!

Sociologists are interested in the experience of different social groups related to gender, ethnicity, social class and age and how these factors may be related to issues of both identity and inequality.

There are lots of different sociological explanations for these matters and you will get the chance to think about which ones make most sense to you. You will also learn about the research methods that sociologists use. Bringing your own experience of society to your studies is an important way of developing your understanding.

Physical Education

A level

This is a two year course with normal formal qualification gained in the first year.

Please note:

(All students will study the AS course and will then have the option to continue their studies of PE to the full A level following the completion of the standalone 1-year course.)

This course focuses on demonstrating and applying knowledge and understanding of the factors that underpin performance and involvement in physical activity and sport.

In addition, you will also learn how to analyse and evaluate these factors. This aspect of the course, which closely links to the topics covered and assessed at GCSE level, is assessed by the exam paper.

The practical, non-examined section, which is assessed by coursework and observation requires the learner to demonstrate and apply relevant skills and techniques in a physical activity / sport of their choice. The written element of this section requires the learner to analyse and evaluate their own performance.

Public Services (Double & Triple)

BTEC Level 3 Diploma & Extended Diploma

This two-year Level 3 course is focused on employment in the Uniformed Public Services including the Police, Fire, Ambulance, Prison Service and Armed Forces.


